4 calendaring methods for dependency cases



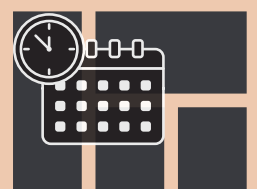

Time-certain calendaring can help reduce wait times to **20 to 60** minutes for parents, children, and professionals.
